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Friends' Visit to Hull

On the 23rd May a number of Friends enjoyed a day out in Hull, where they visited the recently renovated Hull Minster and, in somewhat a departure from the usual kind of visit, The Deep.



One member reported: 'The Minster had the wow factor with no chairs in the nave and no stained glass thus giving a wonderful feeling of space and light. I also enjoyed the Maritime Museum which I felt was special to Hull and unlike any other of its kind. I have never seen penguins before so the visit to the Deep was worth it just to see them!' News from Lincoln Cathedral Connected

Fern Dawson, the Audience Development officer at Cathedral Connected has very kindly compiled a short article about some of the unusual recent finds.

Since 2016, part of the Connected project work has been to better understand the Cathedral's nonarchival collections. Throughout this time, many great discoveries have been made, ranging from the sublime to downright strange!

The first find was a 16th century striking figure, known as a Clock Jack. Its identity had been lost in living memory but was re-identified thanks to a Friends Report, bringing to life a forgotten object.

The strangest find has to be some Easter eggs that were painted to look like members of Chapter from 1973, fake hair and all – a most unusual gift from a member of the Close community.





The most surprising discovery has been the three Cathedral seals, including the original 12th century Chapter seal which was



used by the Dean and Chapter to officially give documents a seal of approval. The small silver object

was found in a box of previously uncatalogued replicas and was believed to be Victorian in date until a closer look revealed the truth. A supreme piece of Norman art is now back at the heart of the Cathedral's collection. The seals are currently on display in the Cathedral Treasury.

Overall, more than 200 objects have been catalogued and recorded since 2016, and work to unlock their stories has only just touched the surface. With more than 1000 years of history within the Cathedral's collection, there are many stories to find. Sharing these finds with the Cathedral community and visitors both in the run up to the new visitor centre and before, will ensure that these stories are not forgotten and this amazing collection is appreciated and preserved for future generations.

Much of the work being undertaken now is to ensure the objects are conserved, as some need specialist conservation before being displayed to ensure their long-term survival. *continued*

One such object is a 17th century Italian Chasuble, which was donated to the Cathedral around 1940. It is recorded as one of the most intact costumes of its time and, although the object does not originate from Lincoln Cathedral, it tells an important story of the Cathedral as a protector of the past and of the people of Lincolnshire who have supported its work over nearly 1000 years.

Every object reflects the people who made them, commissioned them or donated them and finding their stories through objects is what brings them to life again.

Premier League Stuff...

It seems incredible that the Cathedral Choir has been in its new 'Song School' home in Minster Yard for a whole year and that it was nine months ago that composer John Rutter officially opened the building with such a flourish!

There have been many musical highlights during the last year for the choir: a concert to celebrate the return of the Father Willis organ following work on the cathedral's north transept roof; five performances of The Snowman, Handel's Messiah, Britten's Ceremony of Carols with harp, a Christmas broadcast with BBC Radio Lincolnshire, the annual Friends' Carols by Candlelight concert, an Evensong with brass from RAF Cranwell in their 100th year, Vivaldi's Gloria with The Sixteen Choir and Orchestra, Bach's St Matthew Passion, a Jazz Mass and a Duke Ellington concert as part of the Lincolnshire Jazz Week 2018, singing from the cathedral's west front on Ascension Day, two concerts at the International Bomber Command Centre and the recording of a new CD to be released on November 14th: A Year at Lincoln. This is of course all in addition to the 274 sung services given during the last academic year as well!

In July we said farewell to one girl and four boy choristers, but amazingly we had welcomed 13 new choristers during the year too! It is an exciting time for the choir and we currently have choristers from ten different local schools, many of them having joined us quite young; this is great news and we can look forward to some wonderful music in the next few years.

Last year's Choral Scholars left us to take up posts in Wells Cathedral, St Peter's Eaton Square in London, and at Royal Holloway, University of London. Four new scholars have joined Sara (our Friends' Choral Scholar) in their new cathedral house from Durham University, Nottingham University, Blackburn Cathedral and from Royal Holloway. We also send best wishes to Hilary Punnett (our Assistant Organist) and Simon Hogan (from neighbouring Southwell Minster) as they begin married life together and to our matron Fiona Howick and bass lay vicar Nic Beemster on their wedding too! Two of our Junior Choral Scholars, Katie Care and Oliver Jones, are also starting life as

students at Cambridge University; we are very proud of their achievements and having been involved in their preparation for life as Cambridge Choral Scholars.

The last year has been outstanding for the choir and we look forward to our new cassocks! There is a real buzz about everything. As John Rutter put it when he spoke to BBC Radio Lincolnshire: "Lincoln Cathedral Choir is Premier League stuff, it really is!"
